What are the verb forms of 'buy'?

The verb forms of 'buy' are 'buy, bought, bought'.

Have you bought new clothes this week?

Yes, I bought new clothes this week.

No, I haven't bought new clothes this week.

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What are the verb forms of 'pay'?

The verb forms of 'pay' are 'pay, paid, paid'.

Have you ever paid too much for something by mistake?

Yes, I have paid too much for something by mistake.

No, I have never paid too much for something by mistake.

What are the verb forms of 'sell'?

The verb forms of 'sell' are 'sell, sold, sold'.

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Have you sold anything this year?

Yes, I have sold something this year.

No, I haven't sold anything this year.

What did you sell?

What are the verb forms of 'send'?

The verb forms of 'send' are 'send, sent, sent'.

How many SMSes have you sent this month?

I have sent twenty five SMSes this month.

What are the verb forms of 'hear'?

The verb forms of 'hear' are 'hear, heard, heard'.

Have you heard about a new movie in theaters?

Yes, I've heard about a new movie in theaters.

No, I haven't heard about a new movie in theaters.

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What are the verb forms of 'leave'?

The verb forms of 'leave' are 'leave, left, left'.

Have they left this school?

No, they haven't left this school yet.

What are the verb forms of 'make'?

The verb forms of 'make' are 'make, made, made'.

Have made a mistake this lesson?

Yes, I have made a mistake this lesson.

No, I haven't made a mistake this lesson.

What are the verb forms of 'mean'?

The verb forms of 'mean' are 'mean, meant, meant'.

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We learnt the word “thick”.

What did the word mean?

The word ‘thick’ meant ‘ぶ厚い (buatsui).

What are the verb forms of ‘smell’?

The verb forms of ‘smell’ are ‘smell, smelt, smelt.

Did your dinner smell good yesterday?

Yes, my dinner smelt good yesterday.
