We say that we would like to do something:

ex. I would like to swim.

She would like to go to Ireland.

They would not like to be here.

We also say that would like something:

ex. They would like a drink.

We **would like** some cake.

When somebody asks, 'Would you like some coffee?' we answer, 'Yes, please.' or 'No, thank you.'

What's the contraction of 'I would'?

The contraction of 'I would' is 'I'd'.

Contractions: I would = I'd Would not = wouldn't

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What's the contraction of 'would not'?

The contraction of 'would not' is 'wouldn't'.

Would you like to learn English well?

Yes, I'd like to learn English well.

No, I wouldn't like to learn English well.

Would you like to learn English well?

Yes, I'd like to learn English well.

No, I wouldn't like to learn English well.

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Would you like to win 1 million yen?

Yes, I'd like to win 1 million yen. No, I wouldn't like to win 1 million yen.

What do we answer when somebody asks 'Would you like some cake?

We answer 'Yes, please.' or 'No, thank you'.

Ask these:

Would you like some chocolate?

Would you like some sandwich?

Would you like some tea?

We use *another* only with singular nouns:

ex. 'Give me another pen, please.'

We often use other with plural nouns:

ex. 'Give me some other pens, please.'

Give me an example of an adverb.

'Quickly' is an example of an adverb.

Give me another example.

'Slowly' is another example.

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Give me an example of a verb.

'Run' is an example of a verb.

Give me another example.

'Swim' is another example.

Have you studied other foreign languages?

Yes, I have studied other foreign languages.

No, I haven't studied other foreign languages.

Have you travelled to other foreign countries?

Yes, I have travelled to other foreign countries.

No, I haven't travelled to other foreign countries.
