VOCABULARIES

1. Genius /ˈdʒiː.ni.əs/

(noun) very great and rare natural ability or skill, especially in a particular area such as science or art

Ex.: Einstein was a mathematical genius.

2. Discerning /diˈsɜr·nɪŋ/

(adjectives) able to make or usually making careful judgments about the quality of similar things

Ex.: Marion is a <u>discerning</u> judge of good design.

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3. Wise /waiz/

(adjective) having or showing good judgment, or the ability to make good judgments, based on what you have learned from your experience

Ex.: They decided that it was <u>wiser</u> to wait until they were making a little more money before buying a house.

4. Street smart / stri:t.smg:rt/

(adjective) street wise; Wise and sensible

Ex.: You have to be a street-smart.

5. Sophisticated /səˈfɪs-tɪ keɪ-tɪd/

(adjective) having an understanding of the world and its ways, so that you are not easily fooled

Ex.: <u>Sophisticated</u> readers understood the book's hidden meaning.

6. Prehensile /pri hen.sail/

(adjective) gifted with mental grasp or moral or aesthetic perception

Ex.: She is prehensile in terms of writing poems.

7. Nimble / nim-bəl/

(adjective) quick and exact in movement or thought; agile

Ex.: He was nimble in solving mathematical equations.

8. Ingenious /ɪnˈdʒin-jəs/

(adjective) skilled at inventing new ways to do something, esp. To solve problems, or (of ideas or things) original, and showing esp. The ability to solve problems

Ex.: We need an ingenious woman to be a leader.



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Useful Expressions

1. evil genius - a person who has a strong bad influence over other people

Ex.: The film was about an <u>evil genius</u> who wanted to control the world.

2. no flies on somebody - something that you say which means that someone is intelligent and able to think quickly

Ex.: She may be new to this field, but there are no flies on her.

3. beat one's brains out - try very hard to understand something or solve a problem.

Ex.: My grandmother <u>beats her brains out</u> every evening trying to do the crossword puzzle in the newspaper.

4. blind you with science - confuse you with their knowledge by using difficult or technical words

Ex.: When you ask Tim for a simple explanation, he <u>blinds you</u> with science.

5. I wasn't born yesterday - indicate that you are not as foolish or as easily deceived as some people seem to think

Ex.: They fooled me but it turned out that <u>I wasn't born</u> yesterday.

6. brains behind something - the person thought to have planned and organised everything

Ex.: They are the <u>brains behind the robbery</u>.

7. Come to your senses - start to think clearly and behave sensibly.

Ex.: She finally <u>came to her senses</u> and realized that public transport was faster than driving in the city.
