## **VOCABULARIES**

1. Homeschooling / hoʊmˈskuːl.ɪŋ/
(noun) the teaching of children at home, usually by parents

Ex.: Children these days preferred <u>homeschooling</u> rather than traditional schooling.

2. Traditional Schooling

(noun) teacher-centered delivery of instruction to classes of students who are the receivers of information.

Ex.: She goes to a traditional schooling.

#### 3. Academic / æk ə dem ık/

(adjective) relating to schools, esp. colleges and universities, or connected with studying and thinking and not with useful skills

Ex.: Some of my classmates excelled in academics.

### 4. Didactic /dqi dæk tik/

(adjective) intended to teach something, especially a moral lesson

Ex.: Children's books possess a practical, <u>didactic</u> purpose – to instill a love for reading.

## 5. Heuristic /hjuːˈrɪs.tɪk/

(adjective) (of a method of teaching) allowing students to learn by discovering things themselves and learning from their own experiences rather than by telling them things

Ex.: This is a <u>heuristic</u> school which challenges every student.

## 6. Pedagogical / ped ə gadz ı kəl/

(adjective) relating to the practice of teaching and its methods Ex.: The book describes current <u>pedagogical</u> methods used in teaching reading.

## 7. Postgraduate /poust græd3 u ɪt/

(noun) a student who is doing advanced studies after already obtaining one degree

Ex.: I would like to pursue my <u>postgraduate</u> studies abroad.

### 8. Self-educated

(adjective) educated largely through one's own efforts, rather than by formal instruction.

Ex.: I was <u>self-educated</u> at the end of the school year.

## 9. Vocational /voʊˈkeɪ·ʃə·nəl/

(adjective) providing skills and education that prepare you for a job

Ex.: The school offers <u>vocational</u> programs in welding, electrical work, and building maintenance.

### 10. Remedial /rɪˈmid·i·əl/

(adjective) intended to correct or improve something, esp. Skills

Ex.: Students can enroll in remedial English classes.

## **Useful Expressions**

1. To learn something off by heart - To learn something in such a way that you can say it from memory.

Ex.: I learnt all the vocabulary off by heart.

2. To learn the hard way - To have a bad experience.

Ex.: I told her not to marry him. But she had to <u>learn the</u> <u>hard way</u>.

3. The school of hard knocks - Often said about people who haven't had an easy life.

Ex.: He learnt the hard way at the school of hard knocks.

4. To teach an old dog new tricks - The older you are the more set in your ways you become.

Ex.: He could never learn how to use the Internet. Just shows you can't teach an old dog new tricks.

5. To be teacher's pet - To be the favourite pupil of the teacher.

Ex.: She always has the right answer. She's a real teacher's pet.

6. teach a man to fish - Teaching someone how to do something is more helpful to him or her in the long run than just doing it for him or her.

Ex.: You have to teach this man to fish to survive.
