VOCABULARIES

1. Security /sɪˈkjʊər·ɪ·t̪i/

(noun) freedom from danger; safety; the feeling of being confident in one's family and relationships; an investment in a company or in government debt that can be traded on the financial markets

Ex.: The security in the government offices is not very good.

2. job security / dʒaːb sɪ kjʊr.ə.ţi/

(noun) the probability that an individual will keep his or her job

Ex.: Their pay was low and they had no job security or legal rights.

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3. Financial security

(noun) refers to the peace of mind you feel when you aren't worried about your income being enough to cover your expenses. It also means that you have enough money saved to cover emergencies and your future financial goals.

Ex.: We need financial security.

4. social security

(noun) public provision for the economic, and sometimes social, welfare of the aged, unemployed, etc., esp. through pensions and other monetary assistance

Ex.: They are living on a social security.

5. security guard

(noun) a person employed to protect buildings, people, etc., and to collect and deliver large sums of money

Ex.: He works as a <u>security guard</u> for twenty years.

6. collective security

(noun) the cooperation of several countries in an alliance to strengthen the security of each.

Ex.: Several countries need <u>collective security</u> to fight against terrorism.

7. National security

(noun) ability to protect itself from the threat of violence or attack.

Ex. We must deal with threats to our <u>national security</u> regardless of the cost.

8. Data security

(noun) refers to protective digital privacy measures that are applied to prevent unauthorized access to computers, databases and websites.

Ex.: Most companies secure their profiles and documents through data security.

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Useful Expressions

1. security against something - something that keeps something safe

Ex.: A good education is a <u>security against unemployment</u>.

2. Iull someone into a false sense of security - lead someone into believing that all is well before attacking or doing someone bad

Ex.: The boss <u>lulled us into a false sense of security</u> by saying that our jobs were safe and then let half the staff go.

3. Iull you into something/doing something - to make you feel calm or safe when it is not reasonable to feel this way

Ex.: His confidence <u>lulled me into thinking things</u> were somehow going to work out.

4. security blanket - Something that dispels anxiety

Ex.: I always carry my appointments calendar; it's my <u>security</u> blanket.

5. in good hands - in the safe, competent care of someone.

Ex.: Don't worry. Your children are in good hands.

6. Better (be) safe than sorry - You should be cautious— if you are not, you may regret it.

Ex.: It may be time-consuming to check the oil in your car every time you buy gasoline, but <u>better safe than sorry</u>.
