VOCABULARY

1. Pet peeve / pet 'piv/
(noun) something that annoys or bothers a person very much
Ex.: One of my biggest pet peeves is people driving too slowly
on the highway.

2. Annoying /əˈnɔɪ.ɪŋ/
(adjective) making you feel annoyed

Ex.: It's <u>annoying</u> when people keep pronouncing your name wrong.

3. Complaint /kəmˈpleɪnt/

(noun) a statement that something is wrong or not good enough, the act of complaining, or the thing you are complaining about

Ex.: Her only <u>complaint</u> is that she sometimes didn't get enough space in her apartment.

4. Infuriating /ɪn fjʊər i eɪ tɪŋ/
(adjective) causing anger and annoyance

Ex.: Long queues in fast foods are infuriating.

5. Short-tempered /'ʃort 'tem·pərd/ (adjective) tending to become angry quickly and easily

Ex.: Our old-maid teacher is short-tempered.

6. Belligerent /bəˈlɪdʒ-ər-ənt/
(adjective) eager to fight or argue

Ex.: She was so belligerent that I gave up trying to explain.

7. Butthurt / bʌt.hɜːt/

(adjective) offended and upset, especially in a way that is silly or unreasonable

Ex.: He gets all butthurt just because of the picture.

8. Nuisance / nu·səns/

(noun) something or someone that annoys you or causes trouble for you

Ex.: Loud music is a <u>nuisance</u> for people who don't like it.

9. Douche /ˈduːʃ.bæg/

(noun) an insulting term for a rude and unpleasant man who treats people badly

Ex.: Don't waste your time crying over that douchebag.

10. Yob /ja:b/

(noun) a young man who behaves in a very rude, offensive, and sometimes violent way

Ex.: He's such a yob.

Useful Expressions

1. somebody's pet hate - (somebody's pet peeve) something that you do not like at all

Ex.: Falling in line is my pet hate.

2. gets one's goat - If something annoys or irritates you, it gets your goat.

Ex.: I've tried to get along with her, but sometimes she really gets my goat.

3. to be on the warpath - to be looking for someone you are angry with in order to speak angrily to them or punish them.

Ex.: The boss is on the warpath again.

4. haters gonna hate - hate someone or something like sin

Ex.: They admired my dress a lot so haters gonna hate!

He looks at his car. There is a big dent in the back. Then he thinks about the other car—the car he hit this morning. "I know that car is damaged too," he thinks. He feels guilty. "That was not right," Martin says to himself. He will see if the car is still outside his house when he gets off work.
