VOCABULARY

1. Loft /loft/

(noun) Space in the roof of the house usually used only for storage.

Ex.: She lives in a converted loft.

2. Attic / æt ɪk/

(noun) Room in the roof space of a house (could be lived in.)

Ex.: You can get some pillows from the attic.

3. Porch /ports/

(noun) Covered area before the entrance door.

Ex.: The back porch looks out on our garden.

4. Pantry / pæn·tri/

(noun) Large cupboard used, especially in the past, for storing food.

Ex.: We have a big pantry.

5. Terrace / ter-əs/

(noun) Paved area between the house and garden for sitting and eating, etc.

Ex.: I like to stay in a terrace during windy days.

6. Detached /dr tæt[t/

(adjective) Describes a house that is not connected to any other building.

Ex.: We used to live in a detached house.

7. Bungalow / bʌŋ·gə loʊ/

(noun) A house that has only one story/floor.

Ex.: Bungalows are common in our town.

8. Villa / vɪl-ə/

(noun) A house usually in the countryside or near the sea, particularly in southern Europe, and often one which people can rent for a holiday.

Ex.: My grandparents are living in a villa.

9. Bedsit / bed.sit/

(bedsit) A rented room which has a bed, table, chairs and somewhere to cook.

Ex.: Students commonly live in a bedsit.

10. Timeshare /ˈtaɪm.ʃer/

(noun) A holiday house or apartment which is owned by several different people, each of whom is able to use it for a particular period of the year.

Ex.: They bought a timeshare in Florida.

Useful Expression

1. Charity begins at home - It means that, before deciding to take care of other people, one's family should be one's foremost concern.

Ex.: Take care of your children before volunteering in any association. Charity begins at home.

2. a roof over your head - a place to live.

Ex.: He was so poor that he didn't have a roof over his head.

3. home away from home - (also home from home) a place where you are at ease as if you were at home.

Ex.: When I visit her, it was really a real home away from home.

4. home truth - refers to an unpleasant fact about oneself.

Ex.: I told him the home truth.

5. men make houses, women make homes - It's often the men who build or acquire houses for their families, but it's usually women who provide the things that make a house into a home.

Ex.: When her husband bought the house, she took charge of decorating and tidying it up. It's true that men make houses, women make homes.
