VOCABULARY

1. Headline / hed-lgin/

(noun) words printed in large letters at the top of a newspaper story that serve as its title

Ex.: The headline of today's news is creepy.

2. Circulation / sar-kjə lei-ʃən/

(noun) The dissemination of copies of periodicals

Ex.: I learned that news from the circulation.

3. Tabloid / tæb·loɪd/

(noun) a type of newspaper that has smaller pages, many pictures, and short reports

Ex.: The tabloids often attract readers with sensational headlines.

4. Breaking news

(noun) new information about a news event that is still happening

Ex.: We'll bring you all the latest breaking news as it happens.

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5. Newscast / nuz kæst/ (noun) a news program

Ex.: I like watching a newscast.

6. Newsworthy / nuz war ði/

(adjective) interesting or important enough to be included in a news report

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Ex.: The reason my column was <u>newsworthy</u> is that thousands of other people have found themselves in the same boat.

7. Reportage /ri'pɔːr.tidʒ/

(noun) the activity of reporting the news

Ex.: He concentrated on the newscaster's tensely delivered reportage.

Useful Expressions

1. hit the airwaves - When someone hits the airwaves, they go on radio and/or TV to be interviewed or to promote something.

Ex.: The company was embarrassed when the patient <u>hit the airwaves</u> with his side of the story.

2. spread like wildfire - If something such as news, rumours or gossip spreads like wildfire, it becomes widely known very fast.

Ex.: As soon as the nomination was announced, the news <u>spread like</u> wildfire.

3. Make/hit/grab the headlines - to become famous by being reported in the news

Ex.: The team grabbed the headlines today.

4. man/woman of the hour - A person currently being celebrated, honored and admired by others, especially for a recent victory, accomplishment, or other cause for celebration

Ex.: Janet was <u>woman of the hour</u> at the office after securing the biggest customer their business had ever had.
