Vocabulary



1 friendship /'frendsip/

[noun] a relationship between friends

Ex. Did you form any <u>friendships</u> in college?

2 buddy /'bʌdi/

[noun] a friend

Ex. Bob and I have been buddies for years.

3 classmate /'klg:smeit/

[noun] someone who is in the same class as you at school or college Ex. We were classmates in highschool.

4 housemate /'hausmeit/

[noun] a person that you share a house with, but who is not one of your family

Ex. I had three <u>housemates</u> when I lived in London.

5 acquaintance /ə'kweintəns/

[noun] a person that you know but who is not a friend

Ex. Claire has many friends and acquaintances.

Useful Expressions

1 To make friends (with sb): to become a friend of someone.

Ex. I want to make friends with all the people in my company.

2 BFF: This means "best friends forever" and is a slang way to say that someone is your very good friend.

Ex. Sara and Sally are **BFFs**. They go everywhere together.

3 to have something in common : share the same interests or personality

Ex. My best friend and I love dogs. That is what we have in common.

Idioms



1 A friend in need is a friend indeed - a friend who helps you when you really need help is a true friend.

Ex. When Bill helped me with my money problem, I really learned the meaning of "A friend in need is a friend indeed."

- through thick and thin through good times and bad times

 Ex. They've been friends for 20 years. They've really been through thick

 and thin together.
- fair-weather friend A friend who only spends time with you when you are doing well. If you are having trouble this person disappears. He is not a good friend.

Ex. When Tom lost his fortune he realized that he had a few <u>fair-weather</u> <u>friends</u>. They never called him again.

4 have friends in high places - to know important people who can help you get what you want

Ex. You'll need friends in high places if you want to get that job.
