

# Phrasal Verb 101 : Lesson 27 R

Common phrasal verbs, with meanings and examples.  
 Phrasal verbs are usually two-word phrases consisting of **verb + adverb** or **verb + preposition**.  
 Think of them as you would any other English vocabulary.  
 Study them as you come across them, rather than trying to memorize many at once.



I ran into an old school-friend...



"Just ignore him—he's threatened to run away before."

| Verb  | Meaning           | Example   |
|---|-------------------|---|
| <b>run into</b><br><i>someone/<br/>                     something</i> | meet unexpectedly | I <b>ran into</b> an old school-friend at the mall. |

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| <b>run over</b><br><i>someone/<br/>something</i> | drive a vehicle over a person or thing | I accidentally <b>ran over</b> your bicycle in the driveway.             |
| <b>run over/<br/>through</b><br><i>something</i> | rehearse, review                       | Let's <b>run over/through</b> these lines one more time before the show. |
| <b>run away</b>                                  | leave unexpectedly, escape             | The child <b>ran away</b> from home and has been missing for three days. |
| <b>run out</b>                                   | have none left                         | We <b>ran out</b> of shampoo so I had to wash my hair with soap.         |
