3. Focus on Grammar

A. Identify

The **future progressive** describes an action that will be in progress at a specific time in the future: "At 9:00, I will be watching TV" or when another action takes place: "I will be watching TV when you get home."

Future progressive tense is used to indicate action which will be taking place at some time in the future. For example,

I will be singing at Symphony Hall next month.

The *future progressive tense* is formed by adding *will be* to the *?ing* form of the main verb.

She will be coming around the mountain in a few minutes.

The *future progressive tense* is not as common as other tenses, and it can sometimes be replaced *by simple future, present progressive* or even *simple present*.

I'll be leaving in a few minutes.

I'll leave in a few minutes.

I'm going to leave in a few minutes.

I'm leaving in a few minutes.

I leave in a few minutes.
