Grammar Focus:

Present Perfect Tense:

We make the Present Perfect tense with the correct form of the auxiliary verb **have** (have/

has) and the **third form** (past participle) of the mail verb.

To form the past participle of the regular verbs, we add ed to the infinitive.

Examples:

I have worked as a secretary for two years. Have you ever visited the Disneyland? The film hasn't started yet.

Present Perfect - Positive Sentences

1	've	been to Moscow.
You	've	finished the exercise.
Не	's	just gone home.
She	's	already had a holiday this year.
It	's	broken!
We	've	seen this film before.
They	've	bought a new car.
