What do we call this?

We call that a shoulder (or a thumb, a wrist etc.)

What do we call the thing we wear on our heads?

We call the thing we wear on our heads a hat

What do you call your mother and father?

I call my mother and father "Mum" and "Dad"

Have you got any friends?

Yes, I've got some friends

Do you like all your friends?

Yes, I like all my friends

Are all dogs friendly?

No, not all dogs are friendly; some dogs are friendly, and some dogs are unfriendly

moving

still

Is my hand moving? No, your hand isn't moving; it's still

Am I standing still?

No, you aren't standing still; you're moving

Are all the parts of your body still now?

No, not all the parts of my body are still now; my mouth and my tongue etc. are moving

Do you generally sit very still in the lesson?

No, I don't generally sit very still in the lesson; I move

Does she generally sit very still in the lesson?

No, she doesn't generally sit very still in the lesson; she moves

Do you come to school by car, by bus or by train?

I come to school by ...

Does he come to school by (train)?

No, he doesn't come to school by (train); he comes to school by (car)

Do you go home after school by car, by bus, by train or do you walk home?

I go home after school by ... ~ I walk home after school;

I don't go by car, by bus or by train

both

For two people or things, we don't say "all" – we say "both".



Put one hand on your head.

Put both your hands on your head.

Are both your hands on your head?

Yes, both my hands are on my head

Are both these books open?

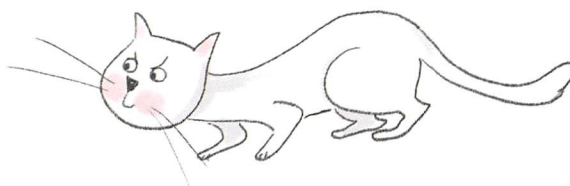
Yes, both these books are open

Have both of you got books?

Yes, both of us have got books

Do you like both dogs and cats?

Yes, I like both dogs and cats ~ No, I don't like both dogs and cats; I only like ...

What's the opposite of "tall"?

The opposite of "tall" is "short"

What's the opposite of "behind"?

The opposite of "behind" is "in front of"

What's the opposite of "with"?

The opposite of "with" is "without"

Can we write without a pen or a pencil?

No, we can't write without a pen or a pencil

Can we speak without opening our mouths?

No, we can't speak without opening our mouths

Can your dad read without wearing glasses?

Yes, my dad can read without wearing glasses ~ No, my dad can't read without wearing glasses

What's the plural of child?

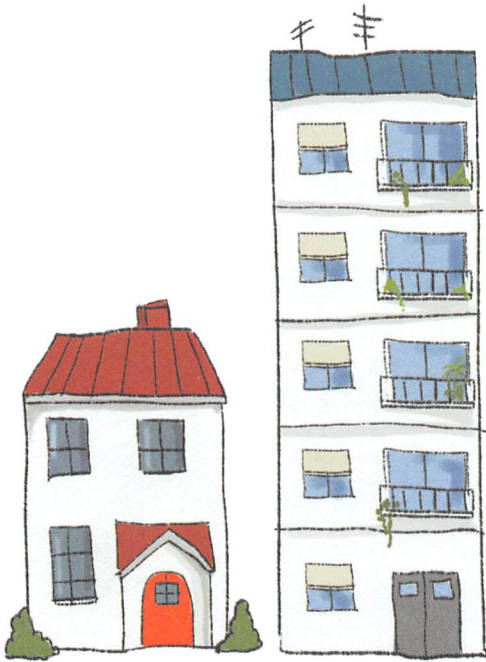
The plural of child is children

A flat is only part of a building

Does Charlie Best live in a flat?

No, Charlie Best doesn't live in a flat; he lives in a house

How many floors has the Best family's house got?

The Best family's house has got two floors

Do you live in this school?

No, I don't live in this school; I live in a house (or a flat)

What's the address of this school?
