Strategy: Choose gerunds and infinitives correctly Improve your knowledge of phrasal verbs

Being familiar with the correct use of gerunds and infinitives and understanding phrasal verbs is helpful for many parts of the TOEIC test. This unit will make you more aware of how they are used, especially in Part 5.

Predict gerund/infinitive questions If the answer choices include both gerunds and infinitives, then you should look at the verb in the question to see which is correct.

Test tip

Learn to recognize gerunds and infinitives

Familiarize yourself with how sentences with gerunds and infinitives sound. In the test, say the phrases to yourself, and try to hear which ones sound wrong. Avoid these choices.

Language building: Gerunds and infinitives

Gerunds are verbs in their base + *-ing* form, e.g. *doing*. Infinitives are verbs in their base form.
