SAMPLE ANSWER

Both parents paly an important role in raising children. A well-adjusted child needs nurturing and guidance from both parents. Therefore, in my opinion, fatherhood is just as important as motherhood because fathers and mothers play different roles in the lives of children, and both influences are equally important to the healthy emotional development of children.

The role of motherhood is often thought of as the more important parental influence because the mother is the principal caregiver in the early states of a child's life. It is the mother who nurtures the child physically, feeds the child and most often forms the first strong parental bond with the child. A mother usually offers the child gentle comforts and constant security in the first few years. The role is critical in the emotional and social development of children, as it is these ties that gives a child confidence and security.

The role of fatherhood is often thought of as a less important one, but in my opinion, a father's influence is equally important to that of the mother. The father often plays the role of provider and protector. While these are generalizations, they still apply to the majority of father/child relationships. In my own experience, my father taught me discipline, control, and encouraged me to work hard. He was less of a physical presence in my life, but his influence was strong nonetheless. I believe it is the combination of both my parents' influences that helped me become successful in life.

In conclusion, I believe that fathers and mothers are equally important in a child's life. Ideally, the roles of the two parents will complement each other and the combination of both will help children reach their full potential.
