

-ing and -ed adjectives





Mr. Brown is annoyed.



1 The commonest -ing adjectives are:

amusing interesting worrying annoying shocking disappointing boring surprising exciting terrifying frightening tiring

If something interests you, you can describe it as *interesting*. If something frightens you, you can describe it as *frightening*, and so on.

I got some interesting news this morning. There was a frightening film on ty last night.

There was a shocking story in the newspaper this morning. I'm going to bed early. I've had a tiring day.

2 The commonest -ed adjectives are:

annoyed finished tired bored frightened worried closed interested broken delighted pleased disappointed excited surprised

If something annoys you, you can say you feel annoyed. If something interests you, you can say you feel interested and so on.

If you break something it is broken. If you finish something it is finished.

Usually these -ed words come after part of the verb be or a few other verbs like feel, look, seem and sound.
