UNIT Reporting the past

$oldsymbol{1}$ You use report structures to give information about what people say or think. Common reporting verbs are:

a with that clauses:

admit agree answer complain explain promise reply say think He agreed that the exercise was difficult. They explained that they would be late. Sally replied that she was busy.

b with verb + person object + that clauses:

convince inform remind tell

We told them that the work was important. I reminded everyone that it was Ben's birthday.

$oldsymbol{2}$ You normally change the tense of what the speaker says:

Speaker's words:

I'm so hungry I could eat a horse! We've just about finished; just one more page. The film was absolutely great.

I'll be with you in a couple of minutes.

Reported clause:

He said that he was very hungry. They said they had nearly finished.

They said the film was great. They said it had been great.

She said she would be here soon.

Note that it is not usually necessary to report every word the speaker says, just the main idea.

There are some changes with modal verbs:

Speaker's words:

Can I help you, sir? OK, it's time. You must stop now.

Reported clause:

The assistant asked if he could help me. The examiner said we had to arrive early.

But be careful: could, would, should, might and ought to stay the same:

We might need some help.

They said that they might need help.

You can use the present tenses in the report clauses if:

a You want to say that something is still true:

My name is Henry.

He said that his name is Henry. (Or 'was')

b You are talking about a future event:




