Past tense with wish and if

f 1 You use wish to talk about something that you would like to happen or to be the case:

You can make a wish about something to do with the present:

It's cold. I wish it was a bit warmer. I'm hungry. I wish I had something to eat.

or about something to do with the past:

I forgot my overcoat, I wish I had brought it. I wish I hadn't forgotten it.

Notice the tenses. You use the past tense to talk about the present, and the past perfect to talk about the past. You also use the past tense of the modals.

You do not use can, you use could:

I'm tired. I wish I could go to bed. It's late. I wish we could go home.

atly prohibited If you want someone to do something but they are not going to do it you can say I wish they would ...:

He's very silly. I wish he would be more careful.

They're very noisy. I wish they wouldn't shout so much.

Often you just say I wish they hadn't or I wish they wouldn't:

They are making a dreadful noise. I wish they wouldn't.

He's gone out again. I wish he hadn't.

$oldsymbol{2}$ You can use an if clause to talk about something which isn't happening:

If I was a year older I could drive a car.

If I had enough money I would buy a new bike.

Notice that you use past tense forms. Very often you have the past tense in the if clause and would or could or might in the other clause:

I'd (I would) certainly come and see you if I had time.

If you lived nearer you could come over on the bus.

If you left before breakfast you might get there before lunch.

Notice that you can use were instead of was in if clauses:

If I were older I could drive a car.

But this is very formal, except in the expression If I were you ... (see below).

There are some very common expressions with this pattern:

If I were you I'd ... is often used to give advice:

A: I'm not very well. What should I do? B: If I were you I'd see a doctor.

I would if I could ... is often used to make an excuse:

A: Will you give me a lift? B: I would if I could, but I'm just too busy.


