Contrast and comparison

A When you want to contrast two statements you can say although or even though:

Although he was late he stopped to buy a sandwich. He went to work every day even though he was very ill.

Sometimes you use the word still to emphasise the contrast:

I still like Anna, even though she is sometimes very annoying. He was still cheerful, even though he was very ill.

Another way of making a contrast is to use in spite of ... with a noun:

He is still very fit in spite of his age. She worked very hard in spite of the difficulties.

In spite of is often followed by an -ing form:

He still failed his exams in spite of working really hard. He won the race in spite of being the youngest competitor.

3 You can compare things by using a comparative adjective with than, or by using as ... as ... (see Unit 64):

This pullover is much nicer than that one, and it's a bit cheaper too. I'm not as young as I used to be. It's not as easy as you think.

4 You use like with a few verbs to talk about things which are almost the same in some way:

Ken is lust like his father. NewYork is like London in many ways. An okapi looks like a small giraffe. Who's that? It sounds like Henry.

These verbs are very commonly used with like:


be feel look seem smell sound taste

You use some adverbs of degree with like:

exactly just rather a bit a little bit nothing



He looks exactly like his father.


