
D. Preposition Errors

(For more information about prepositions, see Lesson 5, Section E, pages 140-149.)

There are two types of preposition errors that appear in the underlined portions of Part VI sentences. These involve preposition choice and the inclusion/omission of prepositions.

Incorrect Prepostition Choice

This type of error involves the use of one preposition when another is required, given the context of the sentence.



Preposition choice depends either on the noun, adjective/participle, or verb that comes before the preposition (as in the first sample item) or on the object that follows the preposition (as in the second sample item).


Incorrect Agreement of Pronouns and Nouns

A singular pronoun must be used to refer to a singular noun, and a plural pronoun to a plural noun. Similarly, a masculine pronoun must be used to refer to a masculine noun, a feminine pronoun to a feminine noun, and a neuter pronoun to a

Incorrect Inclusion of Pronouns

This error involves the unnecessary inclusion of a pronoun. In a main clause, a subject pronoun is unnecessary if there is already a subject noun. In an adjective clause, a pronoun is unnecessary if the relative pronoun takes the place of the personal pronoun.



Noncount Nouns Incorrectly Pluralized

As the name indicates, a noncount noun represents something that cannot be counted. Mass nouns (air, butter, furniture), abstract nouns (glory, sincerity, patriotism), and fields of study (chemistry, engineering, management) are all noncount nouns.
