A Study

Study this example situation:



Last year Jack and Jill spent their vacation at the beach. It rained a lot, but they enjoyed themselves.

prohibited

You can say:

Although it rained a lot, they enjoyed themselves.

(= It rained a lot, but they . . .)

or

In spite of Despite the rain, they enjoyed themselves.

After although we use a subject + verb:

Although it rained a lot, we enjoyed our vacation.

I didn't get the job although I was extremely qualified.

Compare the meaning of although and because:

We went out although it was raining.

We didn't go out because it was raining.

C

After in spite of or despite, we use a noun, a pronoun (this/that/what, etc.), or -ing:

In spite of the rain, we enjoyed our vacation.

I didn't get the job in spite of being extremely qualified.

She felt sick, but in spite of this she went to work.

In spite of what I said yesterday, I still love you.

Despite is the same as in spite of. Note that we say in spite of but despite (without of):

She felt sick, but despite this she went to work. (not despite of this)

You can say in spite of the fact (that) and despite the fact (that):

I didn't get the job { in spite of the fact (that) despite the fact (that) } I was extremely qualified.

Compare in spite of and because of:

We went out in spite of the rain. (or despite the rain)

We didn't go out because of the rain.

Compare although and in spite of / despite:

Although the traffic was bad, In spite of the traffic,
I arrived on time. (not In spite of the traffic was bad)

I couldn't sleep { although I was very tired. (not despite I was tired) despite being very tired.

E

Sometimes we use though instead of although:

I didn't get the job though I had all the necessary qualifications.

In spoken English we often use though at the end of a sentence:

The house isn't very nice. I like the garden though. (= but I like the garden)

I see him every day. I've never spoken to him though. (= but I've never spoken to him)

Even though (not even alone) is a stronger form of although:

Even though I was really tired, I couldn't sleep. (not Even I was really tired)
