Present Perfect and Past (I have done and I did)

A

It is often possible to use the present perfect (I have done) or the simple past (I did). For example, you can say:

I've lost my key. Have you seen it? or I lost my key. Did you see it?

But do not use the present perfect when you talk about a finished time (for example, yesterday / ten minutes ago / in 1985). Use the simple past:

- I lost my key yesterday. (not I've lost)
- It was very hot last summer. (not has been)
- They arrived ten minutes ago. (not have arrived)
- "Did you see the news on TV last night?" "No, I went to bed early."

Use the simple past to ask When . . . ? or What time . . . ?:

What time / When did you finish work yesterday? (not have you finished)

Do not use the present perfect if there is no connection with the present (for example, things that happened a long time ago):

- The Chinese invented printing. (not have invented)
- Beethoven was a great composer. (not has been)

Compare:

- Shakespeare wrote many plays.
- My brother is a writer. He has written many books. (He still writes books.)



Compare present perfect and simple past:

Present perfect (have done)

I've done a lot of work today.

We use the present perfect for a period of time that continues from the past until now. For example: today / this week / since 1985.




- past
- It hasn't rained this week.
- Have you seen Lisa this morning? (It is still morning.)
- Have you seen Lisa recently?
- We've been waiting for an hour. (We are still waiting now.)
- John lives in Los Angeles. He has lived there for seven years.
- I have never played golf. (in my life)

The present perfect always has a connection with now. See Units 7–12.

Simple past (did)

I did a lot of work yesterday.

We use the simple past for a finished time in the past. For example: yesterday / last week / from 1985 to 1991.



- It didn't rain last week.
- Did you see Anna this morning?
 (It is now afternoon or evening.)
- Did you see Anna on Sunday?
- We waited (or were waiting) for an hour. (We are no longer waiting.)
- John lived in New York for ten years. Now he lives in Los Angeles.
- I didn't play golf last summer.

The simple past tells us only about the past. See Units 5–6.
