## May and might (2)

A

We use may and might to talk about possible actions or happenings in the future:

- I haven't decided what I'm doing for spring break. I may go to Mexico. (= perhaps I will go to Mexico)
- Take an umbrella with you when you go out. It might rain later. (= perhaps it will rain)
- The bus doesn't always come on time. We might have to wait a few minutes.

The negative forms are may not and might not:

- Ann may not go out tonight. She isn't feeling well. (= perhaps she will not go out)
- There might not be a meeting on Friday because the director is sick.

В

Usually it doesn't matter whether you use may or might. So you can say:

- I may go to Mexico.
- or I might go to Mexico.
- Lisa might be able to help you. or Lisa may be able to help you.

But we use only might (not may) when the situation is not real:

If I knew them better, I might invite them to dinner.
(The situation here is not real because I don't know them very well, so I'm not going to invite them. May is not possible in this example.)

C

There is also a continuous form: may/might be -ing. Compare this with will be -ing:

- Don't phone me at 8:30. I'll be watching the baseball game on TV.
- Don't phone me at 8:30. I might be watching (or I may be watching) the baseball game on TV. (= perhaps I'll be watching it)

For will be -ing, see Unit 23.

We also use may/might be -ing for possible plans. Compare:

- I'm going to Mexico in July. (for sure)
- I may be going (or I might be going) to Mexico in July. (possible)

But you can also say "I may go (or I might go) to Mexico" with little difference in meaning.

D

Might as well / may as well


Rosa and Maria have just missed the bus. The buses run every hour.

What should we do? Should we walk?

We might as well. It's a nice day, and I don't want to wait here for an hour.

We might as well do something = We should do something because there is nothing better to do and there is no reason not to do it.

You can also say may as well.



- A: What time are you going?B: Well, I'm ready, so I might as well go now.
- Rents are so high these days, you may as well buy a house.
