



HOW THE GRAMMAR WORKS:

We often use Good for you! / Way to go! / I'm so happy for you! / Congratulations! when someone has achieved something through their own effort.

A: I passed my exam.

B: That's great! I'm so happy for you!

We often use Lucky dog! / Lucky you! / You're so lucky! when someone has something good happen to them by chance.

A: I won a trip to Hawaii!

B: That's great! Lucky you!

GET READY.




Work in a group of 3 or 4. Play the Lucky Life Game.

AMY'S HUMOR TIP

Sarcasm is when you say the opposite of what you mean, to be humorous or to show that you are angry. Pronunciation is very important. If someone is being sarcastic, they will say a positive word in a flat voice. If they are being serious, they will say it in a high voice. A: I won a trip to Hawaii!

- B: Lucky you. [flat voice →] = So what? I don't care./ I'm really jealous.
- B: Lucky you! [rising voice 1] = Congratulations!/ That's great!
