

#### Like = an adverb

### What is your dad like?

He is funny.

He is very kind.

This question is asking about personality.

#### What does your dad look like?

He is tall.

He has short hair.

This question is asking about appearance and looks.

## Like = a verb

#### What does he like?

He likes to play golf. He loves tennis.

This question is asking about hobbies and preferences.

## ERIK'S CULTURE TIP

## Talking about family.

In spoken English we often use dad and mom instead of father and mother.

There are many other ways to say grandfather and grandmother, including granddad, grandpa, grandma and granny (common in UK and Australia). We can say big sister and little brother instead of older sister and younger brother.

Note: In British and Australian English "mom" is "mum."
