How to Make a Tissue Paper Flower

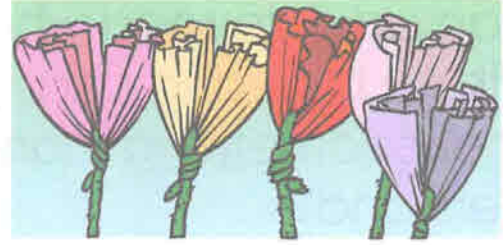
First, cut a square piece of ^{colored} tissue paper. For a small flower, use a 2-by-2-inch square. For a large flower, use a 5-by-5-inch square. Then, place the ^{eraser} end of a pencil in the center of a square. Next, wrap the paper ^{gently} around the pencil. Remove the pencil. Finally, ^{twist} ~~put~~ a green pipe cleaner onto the bottom of the flower for a stem.

Sandy changed **put** to **twist** because it tells what to do with the pipe cleaner.

Sandy added a word that tells how something should be done.
