Lesson 15 Stay on Topic


When you write a paragraph, write about just one thing at a time. If you stay on topic, your writing will be more clear and more interesting.

Paco wrote about planting a tree. Read Paco's paragraph.

There is a new park at the end of the block. We planted an oak tree there last week. First, we had to dig a big hole. Mr. Orez put in some special soil. Then, it took three of us to move the tree into the hole. It was heavy! We all scooped the dirt back around the tree. Then, Mr. Orez taught us a goofy dance. When I was little, I took dancing lessons. He said it would pack the soil down so the tree could stand up. It must have worked. The tree looks great.

Paco did a good job with his paragraph. His ideas are clear, and he tells the steps of planting a tree in order. However, Paco put in a sentence that doesn't belong. The paragraph is about planting a tree. We don't need to know about Paco's dancing lessons. Paco's writing would be just fine without that sentence. Draw a line through that sentence. Then, read the paragraph again.
