

149. (C) Correct. *been postponed*.  
(A) *the meeting ... has to postpone* is not possible. *The meeting* as subject cannot postpone anything.  
(B) is not a correct verb form in this context.  
(D) *the meeting ... has postponed* is not possible. *The meeting* as subject cannot postpone anything.

150. (B) Correct. *on*  
*Based on* is a common collocation.  
(A), (C) and (D) are not possible collocations.

151. (C) Correct. *will be held*.  
(A), (B) and (D) create active forms, *The meeting* cannot do anything. A passive form is required here.

152. (A) Correct. *continue*  
(B), (C) and (D) require an object.

## PART 7

153. (C) Correct. *To announce a special event* – The memo mentions *Casual Friday* as a special event.  
(A) The only change in schedules is for this *Casual Friday*, not *new employees' schedules*.  
(B) The memo mentions *business casual*, not *proper business attire*.  
(D) *All your hard work* is mentioned, not *Mr. Waterman's hard work*.

154. (D) Correct. *Regular business is expected to proceed*. – The phrase *we still expect normal client traffic in the office* tells us this.  
(A) *Shorts* are mentioned, but workers do not usually wear them.  
(B) *Traffic* is mentioned, but referring to business visitors, not downtown traffic.  
(C) This is the opposite of the correct answer. Otherwise they might wear *shorts and flip-flops*.

155. (D) Correct. *Accounting* – The phrase *for the following accounting services* tells us this.  
(A) *Undersigning* refers to *the undersigned*, but this is just an expression used to identify the people involved in this contract.  
(B) This confuses the similar words *carpentry* and *Carpenter*. *Brendan Carpenter* is one of the people who signed the contract.  
(C) A *construction* company is contracting an accounting firm to do work, not vice versa.

156. (A) Correct. *\$1000 plus hourly compensation* – The agreement is to pay *at the hourly rate of \$65 plus \$500 ... upon completion* and *\$500 ... if services are completed by March 15<sup>th</sup>*  
(B), (C) and (D) do not follow this agreement.

157. (C) Correct. *Resources* – The accountant agrees to *provide all necessary software, forms and other materials ... at no extra cost*.

- (A) The contract is for *Accounting services*, this is what he is being paid for.  
(B) *Labor*, meaning work done, will be paid at \$65 per hour.  
(D) *A bonus* will be paid *upon completion*.

158. (D) Correct. *Outside the parent company's home country* – The passage states that *offshore* refers to *outside the boundaries of the home country of the parent company*.

- (A) Associates *offshore* with *an island*, but does not answer the question.  
(B) Associates *offshore* with *on board a ship*, but does not answer the question.  
(C) Is the opposite of *outside the boundaries*.

159. (C) Correct. *They are sent to the country of the parent company*. – The phrase *would be imported exclusively into the US* tells us this. In this case the US is being used as an example.  
(A) Nothing suggests that products are sold in the country in which they are produced.  
(B) The US is mentioned, but only as an example. This passage relates to all countries.  
(D) Products may be *distributed worldwide*, but must first be sent to the home country of the parent company.

160. (D) Correct. *They need technical writers*. – The applicant is applying for this position, so we can assume this statement is true.  
(A) The applicant has had stories published in *Pacific Weekly*. There is nothing to indicate that the company is located in the Pacific.  
(B) Nothing suggests the firm produces clothes.  
(C) *Restaurants* only refers to the applicant's previous work experience.

161. (A) Correct. *Flexible* – He is *willing to relocate* and states *any* for shift preference.  
(B) He does not seem to be *overqualified*, as he has no relevant experience and only a *Liberal Arts B.A. degree*.  
(C) It is not possible to judge from his résumé if he is *witty* or not.  
(D) He has only produced three short stories. This is not *prolific*.

162. (C) Correct. *Online* – He cites *Houstonjobmarket.com* as the answer to *Where did you find out about the position?*  
(A) and (B) do not reflect this.  
(D) is the magazine which published his short stories.

163. (B) Correct. *To learn about the applicant's past job performance* – The phrase *to discuss my work history with the referees* tells us this.  
 (A) This is too broad a statement. Only the work performance is stated as being relevant.  
 (C) This is too specific a statement and is not mentioned. *Dates* and *wages* would not provide much useful information that is not already supplied.  
 (D) Nothing suggests that the reason is to *maintain contact*.
164. (B) Correct. *World gifts* – The goods were delivered to this company.  
 (A) *Woodland Creations* is the supplier.  
 (C) *Arturo Ramirez* was responsible for packing.  
 (D) *Tradewind Shipping* is the delivery company.
165. (D) Correct. *Bookmarks* – 160 were ordered in total.  
 (A) 35 *calendars* were ordered.  
 (B) 60 *keychains* were ordered.  
 (C) 5 *paperweights* were ordered.
166. (B) Correct. *An additional fee will be added.* – The invoice states that *overdue accounts are subject to a monthly interest charge of 14%*, and that *payment (is) due within 30 days*.  
 (A) Uses the same words *invoice* and *remittance*, but does not match the question.  
 (C) *Merchandise may be returned* is stated, but this is not connected to the 30 day pay period.  
 (D) Information is available.
167. (A) Correct. *It's in the mountains.* – The phrases *on the slopes*, *skiing and snowboarding*, and *on the mountain* tell us this.  
 (B), (C) and (D) do not match these phrases.
168. (C) Correct. *Some construction is underway.* – The notice mentions *any inconvenience caused by our remodeling efforts*.  
 (A) Uses the same word *professionalism*, but is not the reason for the apology.  
 (B) Associates *an expanded exercise room* with *the exercise room is too small*, but this is not the reason for the apology.  
 (D) Guests are offered a 10% discount. They are not being over billed.
169. (A) Correct. *A discount on their stay.* – Guests are offered a 10% discount.  
 (B), (C) and (D) will all be offered once the remodeling is complete.
170. (B) Correct. *They have ultra-modern furniture.* – They are said to have *antique* furniture.  
 (A) A *fireplace* is mentioned.  
 (C) The cabins have *all the amenities* of the suite rooms.  
 (D) Cabins are *adjacent* to the main property.
171. (D) Correct. *A computer* – The young woman mentions *the heart of the computer*.  
 (A) A *cellular phone* is just one of the features.  
 (B) *Memory storage* is mentioned, but it is just one of the features.  
 (C) A *computer application* is not being advertised, it is a whole computer.
172. (B) Correct. *She is alone and gesturing a lot.* The advertisement mentions *She's moving her hands around ... but no one else is there*.  
 (A) There is nothing *unusual* about *sitting on a park bench*.  
 (C) She does not *appear* to be carrying a computer, and it certainly isn't big.  
 (D) She says she is *at work in a virtual office*, but it is not in a building.
173. (C) Correct. *It can be used to compose email.* – Nothing is mentioned about this capability.  
 (A) The woman says she can *make even international calls inexpensively*.  
 (B) The headset is *wireless*.  
 (D) The woman describes how she can make *international calls*.
174. (C) Correct. *A CPU, a headset, gloves and sunglasses* – The woman describes these four features.  
 (A) There is no *keyboard* or *mouse*.  
 (B) She only mentions that she can *transfer information into a database*.  
 (D) There is no *mouse* or *monitor*.
175. (D) Correct. *A musician* – He describes himself as an *accomplished musician*.  
 (A) He is writing to the *general manager* of a company.  
 (B) He mentions *children* and talks about child development, but he is not a *child psychologist*.  
 (C) Associates *designers of ... skyscrapers* with *architect*, but nothing else suggests this is true.
176. (B) Correct. *The structure is complex.* – *The complex structure of most classical music ... results in a greater impact*.  
 (A) *Accomplished musicians* are mentioned, but this does not answer the question.  
 (C) The music is said to be quite *soothing*, but this does not *aid spatial reasoning*.  
 (D) The music uses *unconventional instruments*, but this does not *aid spatial reasoning*.
177. (C) Correct. *It uses less traditional instruments.* – This is said to *give the familiar melodies an entirely different flavor*.  
 (A), (B) and (D) are all true, but are not the reason the series is different.

178. (C) Correct. *That Li'l Toys distribute his product* – The phrase *I would be happy to consider distributing my works exclusively through Li'l Toys* tells us this.
- (A) He is sending the *four CDs* for free.
- (B) He does not suggest that Li'l Toys *produce CDs*.
- (D) He mentions that they can contact him for information about *pricing*, but this is not a proposal.
179. (D) Correct. *It has medicinal value.* – The roots are said to *have been found to be effective in the treatment of leukemia and other forms of cancer.*
- (A) The *roots*, not the *seeds* have anti-cancer agents.
- (B) It is grown in *Brazil*, not *by Mediquell*.
- (C) It treats *leukemia*, not *causes* it.
180. (C) Correct. *At least \$30,000,000* – The *development costs are \$30–\$50 million.*
- (A) The amount is disclosed.
- (B) This is not stated.
- (D) *\$2,000,000,000* is the amount of revenue expected.
181. (D) Correct. *It is available straightaway.* – The house is said to be *available to rent from February 2006 and the letter was sent November 14, 2005.*
- (A) The house is *available for rent*.
- (B) The house is *just a short walk from the Pacific Ocean*.
- (C) The house has *1 master bedroom and 3 smaller bedrooms*.
182. (B) Correct. *A new climate control system was put in.* – This relates to *brand new central heating and air conditioning system.*
- (A) *Hardwood floors* are mentioned, but it does not say that they are new.
- (C) *Kitchen appliances* are mentioned, but it does not say that they are new.
- (D) *A 3-car garage* is mentioned, but it does not say that it is new.
183. (D) Correct. *Arrange a time to visit* – The advertisement specifies that interested parties must *call ... to schedule an appointment.*
- (A) *February 2006* is the date the house becomes available.
- (B) *\$2250* is the rent.
- (C) The advertisement specifies *no drop-ins*.
184. (C) Correct. *They enjoy water sports.* – Their letter states that *we're both avid wind-surfers.*
- (A) The letter states the couple *both work*, but it does not say if they *work nearby*.
- (B) The letter states that *(they) were hoping to find someplace a little sooner*, so the *timing* is not *perfect*.
- (D) The letter asks about *space for their pet*, but we don't know if there is space or not.
185. (C) Correct. *The furniture he has is insufficient.* – He states that he *(has) some furniture ... but for a two-bedroom.*
- (A) Nothing about *decorating in his own style* is mentioned.
- (B) Nothing about how much the couple can *afford* is mentioned.
- (D) The advertisement mentions *new appliances*, but Mr. Mealamu does not.
186. (B) Correct. *They help people sell goods online.* – The advertisement states *Our role is to act as intermediary in the sale of new and used goods ... through online auctioning sites.*
- (A) The company does not mention *shops*.
- (C) The company does not *teach people* about online auctions, but sells goods through them.
- (D) Nothing states that the company is a *wholesale distributor*.
187. (C) Correct. *Experience as a receptionist.* – Although *excellent phone manner* is mentioned, this does not mean the applicant must have *experience as a receptionist.*
- (A) *Knowledge of online auctioning* is mentioned.
- (B) *Experience with computers* is mentioned.
- (D) Applicants should have an *energetic, outgoing personality*.
188. (B) Correct. *They worry about buying and selling over the Internet.* She states *there is still a certain hesitation.*
- (A) She *sold a few items*, but she does not say that people generally *sell few items*.
- (C) She says that people lack the knowledge, not the *finances*.
- (D) The advertisement is in the *Sunday Gazette*. Nothing about advertising first in the *Sunday Gazette* is mentioned.

189. (A) Correct. *She has a relevant educational background.* – She cites a *degree in Business Administration.*  
 (B) She worked in a *retail outlet* as an *assistant*, not as a *manager.*  
 (C) She has *past experience* as a *receptionist*, this is not her job now.  
 (D) She is *familiar with major computer applications*, but she is not *experienced in computer programming.*
190. (D) Correct. *She will receive further correspondence.* – The advertisement states *Replies to successful candidates only.*  
 (A), (B) and (C) do not match this information.
191. (C) Correct. *To make a complaint* – She is complaining that a magazine she subscribes to is not being delivered.  
 (A) She is not *ordering a new subscription.* She has existing subscriptions.  
 (B) She *registered a change of address at the time of the move.*  
 (D) She mentions the *quality* of the magazines, but this is not the purpose of her letter.
192. (D) Correct. *It is not being delivered.* – The letter states that *delivery of Wall Street Weekly ceased upon our move.*  
 (A) is the address of *The Periodical People.*  
 (B) is her new business address.  
 (C) is her old business address.
193. (C) Correct. *To check for any misdirected mail* – She writes that *no mail for our company is being received at the old address* upon checking with the property owners.  
 (A) She contacted *The Periodical People* to register a change of address.  
 (B) Nothing about *final rent payments* is mentioned.  
 (D) They placed a *mail forwarding order at the Post Office*, but this was not the reason for contacting the property owners.
194. (A) Correct. *The subscription ran out.* – The reply states that *the subscription was not renewed.*  
 (B) Nothing about non-payment is mentioned.  
 (C) This is the reason suggested by Ms. Calloway, but it seems from Mr. Moreau's reply that this is mistaken.  
 (D) No cancelation letter was received.
195. (B) Correct. *To remind them of subscription renewal* – The letter states that *notices were sent ... regarding renewal of your subscription.*  
 (A), (C) and (D) do not match this information.
196. (C) Correct. *Those that were impractical.* – The report states that *unworkable suggestions ... were discarded.*  
 (A) and (B) do not match this information.  
 (D) is the opposite of the correct answer.  
 Recommendations that *were not seconded by at least 10% of our employees* were dropped.
197. (A) Correct. *Make a counter proposal.* – The options were only to vote *in favor, vote against or abstain.*  
 (B) To *reject* is to *vote against.*  
 (C) To *adopt* is to *vote in favor.*  
 (D) To *abstain* is to *choose not to vote either way.*
198. (B) Correct. *It depends on how good business is.* – They are *based on annual profit margins.*  
 (A), (C) and (D) do not follow this information.
199. (D) Correct. *It is not owned by Mercutio & Canelli.* – The office equipment is *leased.*  
 (A) It is the *internal record-keeping and communications* which we can infer are *paper-based.*  
 (B) Associates *buy out* with the option to *buy out leases on machines.* This is a different kind of buy out, and in any case this is not what would result in the least savings.  
 (C) It is not possible to know if all the company equipment is *getting old* or not.
200. (B) Correct. *2* – This option would lead to energy savings by *dimming lights* when not in use.  
 (A), (C) and (D) would not *lead to reduced energy costs.*
