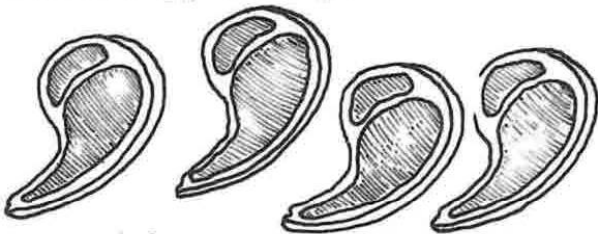
DIALOGUE

RECIPE

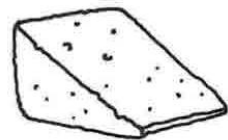
Cheese-Topped Chops



4 chops



chicken broth



cheddar cheese



mushrooms



shallots



1 fresh chili pepper (chopped)
or a pinch of chili powder
(not too much chili)

1. Pour a little chicken broth over the chops.



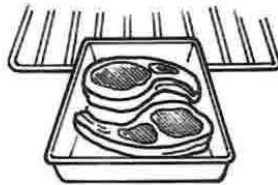
2. Chop the mushrooms, shallots, and cheese.



3. Mix the mushrooms, shallots, cheese, and chili in a bowl.



4. Broil the chops.



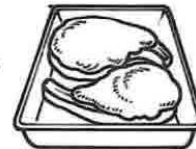
5. Put the chops in a dish.



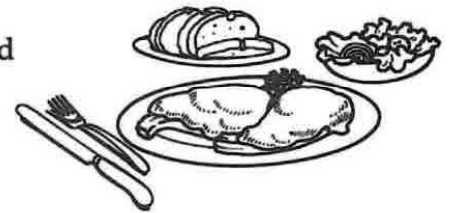
6. Spread the cheese mixture over the chops.



7. Broil the chops and cheese mixture for a few minutes.



8. Serve the chops with French bread and a fresh spinach and mushroom salad.

The sound dʒ is usually written with the letters *j* or *g*.

- j* job, just, joke, January, June, jail, injure, enjoy, subject
- g* (before *e*, *i*, or *y*) general, dangerous, agency, suggest, passenger, engine, original, energy, biology, gym
- ge* village, large, orange, age, average, college, language
- dge* bridge, edge, judge, knowledge
- dj* adjective, adjust

Other spellings:

- d* (before *u* or *i*) educate, graduate, gradual, individual, procedure, soldier
